## 2015 Health Disparity Fact Sheet American Indians/Alaska Natives in Colorado



This fact sheet provides information about some of the major health indicators for the American Indian and Alaska Native (Al/AN) population in Colorado. American Indian and Alaska Native Coloradans experience some differences in health, disease risk factors and health behaviors in comparison to other racial and ethnic groups. The data presented show comparisons between the American Indian and Alaska Native population and the State's total population and identifies where there are statistically significant differences. The disparity column shows if the American Indian and/or Alaska Native rate or prevalence is statistically worse (red), better (green) or the same (white) as the state rate. If it is the same, that means there is no statistically significant difference.

There are about 56,010 American Indian and Alaska Natives in Colorado, which is 1.1 percent of the State's total population.<sup>1</sup>

- The median household income for American Indian/Alaska Native Coloradans is \$22,965 less than the Colorado median.
- More American Indian/Alaska Native Coloradans are living below the poverty level than the overall state population.
- Fewer American Indian/Alaska Native individuals graduate from high school than the overall population.

- Infant deaths and low weight births among AI/AN are not significantly different from the population as a whole.
- American Indian women have more unintended pregnancies and a greater number of American Indian mothers report having three or more stressors during pregnancy compared to the total population.
- American Indian teens have the same teen birth rate as the overall teen birth rate.
- The prevalence of obesity among AI/AN children is not statistically different from the overall, Colorado prevalence.

- Cigarette smoking is more prevalent (common) among American Indian/Alaska Native adults compared to the total population.
- Compared to the total population in Colorado, Al/AN adults are eating similar amounts of fruits and vegetables a
  day and levels of physical inactivity.
- More AI/AN adults are overweight or obese compared to all adult Coloradans.
- Poor mental health is more common among AI/AN adults than the total population.

- More American Indian/Alaska Native Coloradans are uninsured compared to the total population.
- Diabetes is more prevalent among Al/AN adults compared to the total population.
- However, the prevalence of high blood pressure and asthma among Al/AN Coloradans is similar.

• The top three leading causes of death, cancer, heart disease and unintentional injuries, are the same for American Indians/Alaska Native Coloradans as they are for the State's population as a whole. Diabetes is ranked 7<sup>th</sup> for AI/AN, but 8<sup>th</sup> for the State. Suicide ranked higher among AI/AN (5<sup>th</sup>) leading causes of death compared to the total population (7<sup>th</sup>). Homicide/legal interventions were among the leading causes of death for AI/AN Coloradans but not for the population as a whole.
