Funders Collaborative for Youth Organizing (FCYO)	National	Brings together funders and youth organizers to make sure that youth organizers have the resources they need to fight for justice. ¹	Funders and youth organizing directors who are committed to leveraging youth organizing as a driver of social change.
The Partnership for the Future of Learning	National	Supports policies and practices that promote the strength, protection and advancement of education equity and meaningful learning. ²	Education and social justice leaders from over 300 organizations and 20 foundations.
Organization	Geographic Scope of Work	Mission	Target Populations
Alianza NORCO	Fort Collins	Strengthens and empowers immigrants in the community through “key services, civic education, leadership development and community organization.” ³	Immigrant communities, mostly focused on the Latinx immigrant population but including African and Asian immigrants, in Northern Colorado.
Californians for Justice (CFJ)	Statewide- California	Fights to improve the lives of communities of color, immigrant communities, low-income communities, LGBTQ communities and other marginalized communities through youth-powered organizing. ⁴	High school aged youth.

 Note: A **network** is a coalition of organizations. An **organization** is a single, defined group of people who share a collective identity, goals, and program of work.

Colorado Youth Congress	Statewide- Colorado	Drives transformative systems change by working with high school leaders across the political spectrum and from communities across the state including urban, suburban, and rural communities. ⁵	Young people in Colorado between the ages of 14-18.
The Kentucky Student Voice	Statewide- Kentucky	Promotes the collective power of youth across Kentucky by listening, training, and working with students. ⁶	High school students in Kentucky.
Project Voyce	Denver Metro Area	Partners with youth to address the root causes of inequity by cultivating transformational leadership and equitable youth-adult partnerships through training, employment and organizing. ⁷	Young people in historically marginalized communities in the Denver metro area.
Showing Up for Racial Justice (SURJ)	National	Engages white people in organizing for racial and economic justice by creating a network of groups and individuals across the country. ⁸	White people of all ages and socioeconomic backgrounds.
Student Voice	National	Equips students as storytellers and organizers to advocate for educational equity in communities across the country. ⁹	Students in United States public schools.
Together Colorado	Statewide- Colorado	Organizes to place human dignity at the center of public life through non-partisan, multi-racial, multi-faith community organizing. ¹⁰	People of faith across the state of Colorado.
